







NEIGHBOURHOOD HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. GOUGH STREET** | Filled with hip eateries and unique boutiques, this street is great destination for quirky local retail and dining.
- 2. NOHO** | North of Hollywood Road is a natural extension of Soho and continues up alongside The Escalator. Its narrow streets are full of restaurants, eclectic boutiques and funky art galleries.
- 3. PMQ** | The former Police Married Quarters now serves as a creative hub for aspiring entrepreneurs. Often showcasing art exhibits and holding community events, the complex offers a wide variety of dining options, from relaxed cafes to exquisite dining.
- 4. HOLLYWOOD ROAD** | This old tree-lined road is known for a mix of contemporary art galleries, old antiques shops and local street stalls.
- 5. MAN MO TEMPLE** | One of Hong Kong's oldest temples. Intricate carvings, altars, and the everyday burning of incense coils make Man Mo Temple a calm oasis of tradition on bustling Hollywood Road.
- 6. TAI PING SHAN STREET** | Artisanal bakeries, boutique clothing stores and cutting edge coffee shops give youthful energy to one of Hong Kong's oldest streets.
- 7. POHO** | The neighbourhood of Po Hing Fong, once a sleepy residential area during the 1960s, now welcomes a trendy wave of bohemian cafes, boutiques and design studios.
- 8. WESTERN MARKET** | One of the oldest structures in the city, this Edwardian-style icon is home to fabric merchants who originally traded in the old alleyways of Central.
- 9. HONG KONG-MACAU FERRY TERMINAL** | The departure terminal for the high-speed ferry ride to Macau, "Vegas of the East".
- 10. MAN WA LANE** | Also known as Chop Alley, this small lane is filled with decades-old kiosks making traditional carved signature seals or "chops" that are still in use today.
- 11. STAR FERRY (PIER 7)** | A ferry ride across Victoria Harbour provides unsurpassed views of Hong Kong's soaring skyline and is one of the most unforgettable experiences for any visitor to the city.
- 12. HONG KONG MARITIME MUSEUM (PIER 8)** | Discover the history of maritime exploration between East and West while keeping abreast of recent developments in maritime travel and technology.
- 13. IFC MALL** | This 800,000 sq. ft. shopping mall borders Victoria Harbour and boasts world-class luxury shopping, restaurants and a cinema.
- 14. CENTRAL MARKET** | This 80-year-old Grade 3 Historic Building, located in Central was the first wet market in Hong Kong and has been revitalised into a "Playground for All", featuring an eclectic mix of shops, food stalls, specialty restaurants, event spaces and more.
- 15. LAN KWAI FONG** | Home to over 90 restaurants and bars, "LKF" is one of the city's most popular areas for dining and drinking and ranges in style from weekend jello shot competitions to formal fine dining.
- 16. TAI KWUN CENTRE FOR HERITAGE AND ART** | Formerly a colonial police station, Herzog & de Meuron, the celebrated architects, grafted a series of new structures on to the original bones of this historic site to create a new hotspot for cultural and leisure events.
- 17. SOHO** | This district, located both above and South of Hollywood Road is a wildly popular hub for dining, socialising and hanging out. Come during the daytime for offbeat shopping. Hang around until sundown when buzzing, multicultural dining scene really comes alive.

BEYOND THE NEIGHBOURHOOD

- DISNEYLAND** | Enjoy rides, attractions, entertainment and casual dining across seven magical lands. See Mickey Mouse and the gang by MTR (get off at Sunny Bay Station and board the Disneyland Resort Line).
- OCEAN PARK & WATER WORLD** | Local and exotic animals, deep sea creatures, brand-new water park and roller coasters will keep children and adults alike entertained for the day. Reach Ocean Park by MTR (get off at Ocean Park Station).
- THE PEAK** | The fastest route to Hong Kong's most famous viewpoint is the charming Peak Tram (board at the terminus on Garden Road). The summit boasts breathtaking vistas, peaceful nature trails and a shopping and entertainment complex.
- REPULSE BAY** | Take a breath, hit the beach then shop till you drop along the boulevard of Repulse Bay. You can get there by public bus (Bus 6, 6A, 6X, 66 or 260 from Exchange Square).
- WEST KOWLOON CULTURAL DISTRICT** | It is one of the largest cultural projects in the world, blending together art, education, open space, hotel office and residential developments and retail, dining and entertainment facilities with the opening of M+, Xiqu Centre and the Hong Kong Palace Museum.
